Universal and correct wearing of masks	Y	In accordance with guidance from the CDC and applicable guidance and requirements issued by local, county, or state authorities, the School requires that employees wear a Face Mask at all times when on campus. We do not, however, mandate masks for students, though highly recommend/encourage it.
Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding)	Y	Spaces at tables (we do not use desks) have been allocated at 3-foot intervals, as well as provided clear desk guards for intensive one-on-one instruction.
Handwashing and respiratory etiquette	Y	We used ESSER funds to install two 5-spigot handwashing stations on our playground for better handwashing, as well as touchless hand-sanitizer stations in every classroom. Also, we are in the process of upgrading our HVAC.
Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation	Y	Classrooms are equipped with air purifiers and frequently touched surfaces are cleaned regularly throughout the school day. In addition, our janitorial service provides UV Light disinfecting of all classrooms once/week.
Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments	Y	We are in contact with the Yavapai County Health Department to assist with any identified cases that would warrant contact tracing.
Diagnostic and screening testing	N	We do not provide testing but provide information where testing is available.
Efforts to provide vaccinations to school communities	N	We do not provide vaccinations but provide information about where they are available.
Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies	Y	All students with disabilities receive accommodations specifically to address health and safety policies.
Coordination with State and local health officials	Y	Throughout this epidemic, Skyview School has maintained a close relationship with the Yavapai County Health Department, not only through immediate reporting of positive cases and/or quarantines, but in seeking advice on correct procedures and protocols.

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### How the LEA will Ensure Continuity of Services?

All students will continue to receive both academic and SEL services.

### Students' Needs:

Academic Needs	Should students be required to quarantine, they will have access to all curriculum and support from teachers, as well as technological support (chromebooks), if needed, through Google Classroom and other online portals.
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	Skyview School contracts for an on-site counselor who is available 1 day/week for all students, at no cost.
Other Needs (which may include student health and food services)	Unlimited disposable masks are available to all students, as well as a separate "first aide" space for students who need to be isolated while waiting for parent or guardian pick-up. We also are available as a resource for all Skyview families in regards to information and support options.

### Staff Needs:

Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	We are providing extensive PD opportunities for SEL to our staff (teachers, classroom aides and administrators). We also meet once per week as a staff to support whatever needs they may have.
Other Needs	During the height of the epidemic, our governing Board passed a motion to provide staff additional discretionary time off for Covid-related leave. Should another rise in cases occur, this would again be considered by the Board.
